FARMER BURTON'S COUNTRY TALK WEATHER!!

Last year, 2022 will be remembered for passing two significant milestones, a



daily maximum temperature of more than 40C and an average temperature over year of more than 10C. It was the warmest year on record and my crops suffered from the heat bet evervone remembers their parched lawns? Well, 2023 has been very different. June was confirmed as the hottest June on record,

with an average temperature of 15.8C, then July was one of the wettest. Downpours and strong winds made it feel more like Autumn (while the Continent roasted)!

I was very lucky that my wheat didn't go flat but some farmers had crops that looked as though a steamroller had crossed them, making harvesting very difficult and making quality poor. Oilseed rape was a nightmare for many with storms knocking the seeds out, onto the ground. I am also fortunate that having only a few acres to harvest, I could wait until it was dry enough to combine and tip straight into my store, without having any additional drying costs. We finished the wheat on August 17th and it's always a good feeling when it's safely gathered in. The rain actually helped raise the yield of this year's crops, plumping up the grains and, on the advice of my agronomist, I applied Sulphur as a foliar feed during the Spring because there isn't enough Sulphur in the atmosphere now, since the Clean Air Act decades ago. I think this helped my yields also.

One of the hardest crops I have always struggled to establish are my wild bird covers, but this year I prepared all my land and drilled it at just the right time before the rains came down. I can honestly say that they have never looked so good, I only wish my dad could have seen them. Although he would have probably complained that they were too thick and we wouldn't be able to beat the pheasants out of them on the shoot!!

We've just got to prepare the stubbles now for next year's crops and discing them up started today
