During this period of religious ferment as the monarchy changed from Catholic



to Protestant, sentiment in the country ran very high. The Catholic plotters had intended to assassinate Protestant King James I and his ministers by blowing up the Palace Westminster. Celebrating the survival, people bonfires around London; and months later, the Observance of 5th November Act mandated an annual public day

of thanksgiving for the plot's failure. (This was repealed in 1859).

It is called Guy Fawkes Day because he was the unfortunate one who was caught with the gunpowder under the Houses of Parliament. His fellow conspirators were John and Christopher Wright, Robert and Thomas Wintour, Thomas Percy, Robert Keyes, Thomas Bates, John Grant, Ambrose Rookwood, Sir Everard Digby and Francis Tresham. The latter was from Rushton near Kettering and you can visit his father's half-built house Lyveden New Bield now owned by the National Trust (picture above).and his Rushton Triangular Lodge owned by English Heritage

At one time pet owners used to be able to prepare for Bonfire Night, but nowadays the celebrations can be anytime over a two-week period or more.

DOG CONTROL UPDATE

Further to the article last month on the control of dogs in Easton, Huntingdon District Council have confirmed that the Public Space Protection Order (PSPO) has been extended for a further 3 years. This order now includes further measures to tackle out of control dogs. The conditions are to challenge the behaviours of irresponsible dog owners or those in charge, which includes protecting public spaces from dogs which damage or destroy other animals, cause people alarm and/or distress, and from people responsible for dogs that repeatedly stray.
